Toner Cartridges

There are several companies out there that Most companies, such as Hewlett Packard, include a return shipping ticket with the purchase of a new toner cartridge. They will recycle the used cartridge for you at no cost. Look out for the ticket in your toner box, or call the company you purchased the cartridge to request one.

Why recycle ink or reduce ink usage?

- Cartridges are made from plastic, and it takes 80% less energy to make plastic from recycled plastic.
- If you recycle cartridges, they don't end up in your landfill (or worse, your burnbox smokestream).
- The dyes and pigments that make up the inks take resources, and their manufacture can create a number of pollutants.

Tips on printing/copying

Can you reduce your inkjet/toner usage?

- Do you have to print a hard copy?
- Can you send the information electronically instead?
- If you are not printing a final draft of something, can you change the settings on your computer to print 'draft' or 'low' quality? This is especially important if you are printing a lot of photos or dark graphics which use up more ink.

If you're running low on ink and your printouts/copies are coming out light, sometimes you can get a little more life out of your cartridges if you remove them from your printer/copier, gently shake them, and then return them to the printer/copier.
